


Australia Awards midwives contributing to Papua New Guinea's health



From 2012, there has been 1,576 Australia Awards In-PNG scholarship graduates for health. This has resulted in an additional:

 **508**
midwives

 **630**
community health workers

 **438**
nurses

These scholarships represent a total investment of just over PGK 84 million, of which **PGK 18 million** was through midwifery scholarships.

The Governments of Australia and Papua New Guinea are working in partnership to achieve national health targets. Australia Awards scholars gain knowledge and skills that empower them to contribute to development in the communities they work and strive for a better future.

Papua New Guinea (PNG) has one of the highest maternal mortality ratios in the Asia-Pacific region.

The common causes of maternal mortality are haemorrhage, diseases such as malaria and tuberculosis, unsafe abortion, sepsis, eclampsia and infection.

Trained midwives hold the key to reducing maternal mortality, but PNG suffers a severe shortage of specialty qualified nurses.

Since 2012, the Government of Australia has worked in partnership with the Government of Papua New Guinea to support the development of PNG's midwifery human resources through investment in scholarships for midwives and capacity building support for health training institutions that deliver midwifery training.

Australia Awards investment in midwifery scholarships has had a positive impact on the midwifery profession, education and services. Evidence shows that there is an increase in the number of midwifery graduates over the years and that these graduates are actively applying their newly-acquired skills and knowledge across PNG.

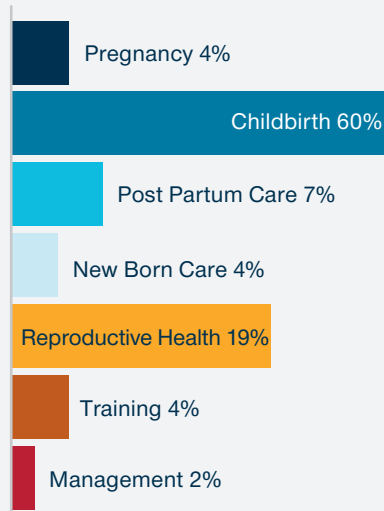

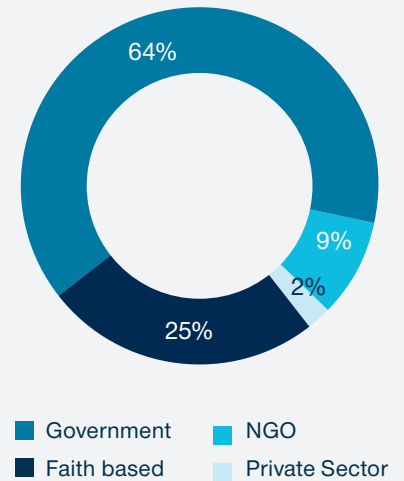
